In 1992, the Morrill Worcester Wreath Company in

Harrington, ME, had a surplus of Christmas wreaths at the end of the holiday season. Recalling a boyhood trip to the cemetery, Mr. Worcester donated to Arlington National Cemetery 5,000 wreaths to honor the cemetery's dead, with the help of volunteers and a local trucking company. After thirteen years of similar donations, in 2005 a photo of snowy gravestones covered with wreaths at Arlington received widespread circulation on the internet. Thousands of people called Worcester, wanting to replicate the wreath-laying service at their own veteran cemeteries. Thus was born the **Wreaths Across America** experience.

Today, each December on National Wreaths Across America Day, WAA's mission to "Remember, Honor and Teach" is carried out by coordinating wreath-laying ceremonies at Arlington National Cemetery and at 3,000 additional locations in all 50 states and abroad, including Princeton Battlefield State Park.

Colonnade and Gravesite Princeton Battlefield State Park 500 Mercer Street, Princeton, NJ On the frosty morning of January 3, 1777, after an overnight march from Trenton, General George Washington and his American soldiers engaged the British Army in the fateful **Battle of Princeton**. At first the British scattered the Americans into nearly disastrous retreat. But then, with bold leadership, General Washington charged onto the field into the line of fire and rallied the patriots. Soon the Americans put the British on the run and prevailed to win the day—and save the American Revolution.

Forty Patriots and 275 British soldiers died during Battle of Princeton. Some, from both sides, rest eternally in a grave on the field near the Colonnade.
