EXPERIENCE THE BATTLE OF PRINCETON

January 2, 2022 dawned overcast and wet from the previous day's rain, but temperatures in the 50s belied Winter. Approximately 100 British and American reenactors appeared on the Princeton battlefield. A crowd of over 450 spectators from all parts of New Jersey, as well as from Pennsylvania, New York, Delaware, and Maryland, grew silent. Will Krakower, Historical Interpreter for the NJ State Park, welcomed everyone and introduced Michael Russell, president, who related the significance of the battle and of the men who fought here. Then, with a loud "HUZZAH!" from Krakower, an opening

volley of muskets from the British's 17th Regiment of Foot came from the western ridge of the field. "Experience the Battle of Princeton" had begun.

The British swept into the swale and were met by Mercer's Brigade. Brigadier General Hugh Mercer went down and was bayoneted seven times by the British. Delaware's Colonel John Haslet was killed, Captain William Leslie of the 17th Regiment was mortally wounded. The British had the advantage and began to advance across the Quaker farms of William Clarke and his brother, Thomas, as the Americans retreated. From the high ground near the Thomas Clarke farmhouse, American artillery units under Captain Joseph Moulder opened fire which was returned by British artillery. The sharp

sounds of muskets were heard all over the field, and men from both sides went down. And as the battle hit its peak, General George Washington appeared from





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the northeast side of the field leading two regiments of experienced New England Continental troops, sweeping the outnumbered British back in retreat. Washington and his troops had won the day.

The "Experience the Battle of Princeton" reenactment was over and the large audience of spectators applauded.

Reenactors remained on the battlefield to discuss weapons and uniforms with spectators, as well as to offer more battle insight and historic interpretation. The level of interest in the Battle of Princeton underscored why living history is beneficial to a greater understanding of our heritage.

Following the reenactment a wreath laying ceremony at the Colonnade, organized by the SAR's Roger Williams, honored the soldiers who died at the Battle of Princeton and the 24 unknown British and American soldiers memorialized at the adjacent Memorial Grove. Over 100 spectators participated, including reenactors, officers and members of the New Jersey Society Sons of the Revolution, the Daughters of the American Revolution, the New Jersey Sons of the American Revolution, the

Society of the Cincinnati, SAR Color Guard units from New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, New England and Pennsylvania, local dignitaries, and military units with lineage to the Battle of Princeton, including:

- ★ 2nd Battalion Royal Anglian Regiment B Leicester Company (Rutland, England), representing the 17th Regiment of Foot,
- ★ 1st Infantry Division, 1st Battalion, 5th Field Artillery (Fort Reilly, Kansas), representing the New York Provincial Company of Artillery (aka "Alexander Hamilton's Own"),
- ★ Pennsylvania Army National Guard, 1st Division, representing the Philadelphia Associators, 111th Infantry Battalion,
- ★ Pennsylvania Army National Guard, representing the Philadelphia Artillery Battalion, 103 Engineer Battalion (aka "The Dandy First"),
- ★ Delaware Army National Guard, representing Haslet's 1st Delaware Regiment, the 198th Signal Battalion,
- ★ New Jersey National Guard, representing Neil's Battery, East New Jersey Artillery, the 112th Field Artillery Battalion.

ROGER S. WILLIAMS TO RECEIVE *** 2022 MERCER OAK AWARD

"The Mercer Oak Award represents a love for American history and especially the Battle of Princeton and our War for Independence," explained Michael Russell, president of the Princeton Battlefield Society. "This year's recipient is an outstanding public historian and an enthusiastic historical interpreter dedicated to telling the Battle of Princeton's human and military story." With these words he announced the 2022 Mercer Oak Award recipient, Roger S. Williams.

Williams will receive his award at a June 16 reception at The Nassau Inn.

"Roger has been a dedicated friend of the battlefield and a long-time interpreter of American history. He eagerly shares his love for this historic location and its significance to the American Revolution," stated Russell. "Roger's sense of history and his vivid interpretation of this national event and the Ten Crucial Days of 17776-77, bring a greater awareness to

life for visitors as they walk through and tour Princeton's landmark park."

"Growing up in Princeton, I can remember my Father bringing me to the battlefield," Williams recalled. "I have fond memories of walking where history happened. I've always felt a sense of witness to the events and experiences of people and what happened on this field on January 3, 1777. It is an honor to share their stories."

This dedication to the battlefield and the Battle of Princeton have been hallmarks during Williams' career as a book publishing professional. He served as a trustee of the Princeton Battlefield Society and developed its current logo, re-developed its website, developed the Battlefield Tour Program, and contributed to the creation of new educational materials. He continues to serve as an Historical Battlefield Interpreter and tour guide. As

State Historian for the New Jersey Society, Sons of the American Revolution, Williams recently chaired the wreath laying ceremony at the Colonnade during the Princeton Battlefield Society's Experience the Battle of Princeton. The ceremony brought together color guard units from heredity societies from various states and representatives of military units with heritage lines back to the Battle of Princeton, including a British Army officer representing the 17th Regiment of Foot which fought here.

In addition to his years of service to the Princeton Battlefield, Williams is the co-founder of TenCrucialDays.org, an organized affiliation of organizations committed to the promotion of ten days in 1776-77, from Washington's crossing of the Delaware to his victory at Princeton, that "turned the tide of American fortunes toward independence." He also developed the tour program for the Washington Crossing Historic Park,

published local historic authors, Larry Kidder, Jerry Hurwitz, and David Price, and created the successful online program, HistoryAuthorsTalk.org, which brings American Revolution historians to national prominence. He serves as president of the Princeton chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution and is active on several national SAR committees. "In his spare time," Russell noted, "he serves on the Spirit of Princeton Committee, is a member of numerous historic, academic, and preservation organizations, and is executive producer of a musical, currently in development, about Washington's Crossing and the Ten Crucial Days."



BOOK RECOMMENDATION

The Heritage Trail Association of New Jersey (Editors Linda Barth, Sean Blinn, and Margaret W. Sullivan) published *The Continental Army Comes into Its Own: The Middlebrook Cantonment of 1778-1779*. This new work includes articles presented at a 2019 symposium about New



Jersey's central role in the American Revolution. The work presents original research and previously unreleased findings about George Washington's strategic positioning of the army in the Raritan Valley during the winter of 1778-1779. By spending that winter training and concentrating on resupply, the period marks the point when the Continental Army "became a professional fighting force" and became one of organization, consolidation, and with a sense of order, all critical to the American victory.


EYEWITNESSES OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION VIDEO

With a grant from the New Jersey Historical Commission, six "eyewitnesses" from the Society's Eyewitness of the American Revolution cards were selected for videotaping and virtual programming. The first-person narratives for Sergeant Nathaniel Root (20th Continental Regiment), Susannah (Enslaved Woman of the Clarke Family), Captain William Leslie (17th Regiment of Foot), Ann Clarke (Wife of William Clarke), Captain Joseph Moulder (Philadelphia Associator Artillery), and Dr. Benjamin Rush (Continental Army Medical Officer) were videotaped at locations at the Battlefield, each portrayed by an amateur actor in appropriate costume. The final video will be available on the Society's website, www.pbs1777.org, and through

social media. The project received hands-on professional assistance from Paul Kelley, Production Director, Matt Matrale, Videographer and Editor, and Will Krakower, the Park's Historical Interpreter.

Wreaths Across America

On December 18 a Wreaths Across America commemoration ceremony was held at the Colonnade, co-ponsored by the Princeton Battlefield Society, Sons of the American Revolution, Daughters of the American Revolution, and New Jersey Freemasons of Mercer Lodge No. 50, Princeton Lodge No. 38, and District No. 15. The program included Princeton University ROTC, 1st Rhode Island Regiment (Trenton), and the Marine Corps League, Trenton Detachment 207. Michael Russell, president, presided over the ceremony. The Marine Corps League trooped the colors. Rev. John H. Harris, Jr. offered the invocation and benediction. Park Historical Educator, Will Krakower, related the significance of the Battle of Princeton and the "meaning of this place". The 1st Rhode Island Regiment and other re-enactors fired tribute volleys and NJ Grand Lodge Grand Soloist, Ray Foose, sang the tribute hymn.





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
