Anniversary trailer and displays from the Ocean County Cultural & Heritage Commission, and information tables from area historic organizations and sites.



The day was capped off with a New Jersey Sons of the American Revolution ceremony unveiling a new plaque at the Clarke House cannon commemorating the death of Brigadier General Hugh Mercer.

*** TRAVERSING THE *** TEN CRUCIAL DAYS BUS TOUR

Are you looking for an opportunity to retrace the December 25 Crossing of the Delaware and the December 26, 1776 through January 3, 1777 American and British military engagements at Trenton, Princeton and areas in-between? Here's a tour for you.

Historical interpreters Roger Williams and Larry Kidder, on behalf of the Friends of the Washington Crossing Park-Pennsylvania, will tell the remarkable story of the ten days in 1776-77 that breathed crucial new life and

a new sense of possible victory into the American Revolution. Events are discussed in the context of the strategically important central New Jersey towns, villages, and farms. Real people are weaved into their presentations – Quakers, Presbyterians, and Anglicans, each with views on their loyalty to the Revolution or the King or as neutrals. These are some of the same people who appear in the 28 Eyewitness of the American Revolution cards and in the videos produced by the Princeton Battlefield Society.



Hear how the terrain, weaponry and weather influenced the ways the battles were fought and how the lives of local people were disrupted. See where armies marched, fought and struggled to survive on an otherwise peaceful landscape, while the course of American history hung in the balance.

The next public bus tours will be offered on December 4 and 10 and January 7, the day before our Experience the Battle of Princeton.

Tours last from 9 AM to 5 PM. The cost is \$150 per person and includes bus fare, lunch, and donations to Washington Crossing Historic Park, The Washington Crossing Park Association-New Jersey, The Old Barracks Museum in Trenton and the Princeton Battlefield Society.


FALL CLEAN UP DAY

BOOK RECCOMENDATION *THE BATTLE OF HARLEM HEIGHTS, 1776* by David Price

David Price is an Historical Interpreter for the PBS Battlefield Tour Program and the author of JOHN HASLET'S WORLD, THE ROAD TO ASSUNPINK CREEK, and RESCUING THE REVOLUTION. He reviews his new book for our HUZZAH! newsletter.

The Battle of Harlem Heights is a largely unappreciated milestone in American military history. This engagement on upper Manhattan Island on September 16, 1776 presaged the gradual emergence of an effective fighting force among the citizen-soldiers who made up the Continental Army and bore the brunt of young America's struggle for political and economic self-determination. The cooperative effort of regiments from New England, Maryland, and Virginia—whose men lacked any sense of national identity before the Revolution— indicated the potential for this fledgling army to cohere around a common national purpose and affiliation and become the primary instrument for gaining American independence. The action began when a contingent of rangers led by Colonel Thomas Knowlton of Connecticut encountered British light infantry while conducting a reconnaissance mission. What began as a skirmish transformed into a full-fledged battle as both sides reinforced, and a heavy engagement continued for several hours until, with ammunition running low, the British withdrew. Washington decided not to pursue and risk confrontation with a larger force, thereby keeping his army intact. In *The Battle of Harlem Heights, 1776*, the significance of the Continental Army's victory highlights the role of one of its key participants, the largely forgotten Knowlton –"father of American military intelligence" – who gave his life during the action while urging his rangers forward.


