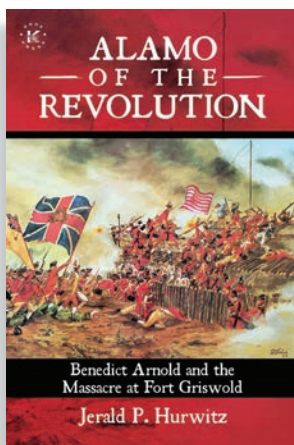

★★★★ BOOK RECOMMENDATION: ★★★★★ *ALAMO OF THE REVOLUTION: BENEDICT ARNOLD AND THE MASSACRE AT FORT GRISWOLD* – BY JERRY HURWITZ

Before the British surrendered at Yorktown, Benedict Arnold led 1,800 British troops on a punitive expedition to destroy the American privateer base in New London, Connecticut. The result, as told by Jerry Hurwitz, was a bloody assault on Fort Griswold and the near massacre of its defenders on September 6, 1781.

Following the capture of the British merchantman, the *Hanna*, with luxury goods destined for British officers in New York City, permission was given to Arnold to lead an amphibious expedition to destroy the American privateer base in New London. Being a native of the region, Arnold had intimate knowledge of the port and its defenses, including the most powerful



fortification, Fort Griswold. The fort was so important that one-half of Arnold's forces landed for the sole purpose of its capture.

But Arnold miscalculated the fort's strength and its defenders' determination, which would have grievous consequences both for the attackers and its outnumbered (161) defenders. In the end the British suffered close to 200 casualties and the patriots faced catastrophic losses amounting to 80%.

This long-forgotten American Revolution story is told by Jerry Hurwitz, president emeritus of the Princeton Battlefield Society. *ALAMO OF THE REVOLUTION* is available online or wherever books are sold.
